# Scan Cut projects

## **Paper Flowers**





These spring flowers were done using a basic flower shape that is just one of the many built-in designs on the ScanNCut.


MATERIALS: Patterned Paper or Colored Cardstock, Glue Scissors, ScanNCut and Accessories

**step 1.** Cut out multiple flowers using a variety of colored or patterned papers. (For this example, I used just four of the same size (5.5" wide) and shape of flower.)



#### step 2.

Flower 1: Cut once between two of the petals.









#### step 2. Flower 2: Cut out one petal.

Flower 3: Cut out two petals.




Flower 4: Cut out three petals.



Note: I drew lines on the flowers so you could see exactly where I cut them apart, but you won't need to do that on your flowers.

step 3. Use the stylus that comes with the ScanNCut to curl back each of the petals.






#### **PAPER FLOWERS (CONTINUED)**



**step 4.** Now we're ready to reassemble each of the flower layers. Overlap the two end petals and glue them together. Repeat that for each of the flower layers.



#### step 5.

5. For the flower centers, we are going to use those petals that were cut off. Take the two-petal piece and bend it so that the ends meet up again, and then add a touch of glue to keep it closed. Repeat that for the three-petal piece.



### step 6.

Assembling the flower: Place the two-petal piece inside the three-petal piece. If desired, you can use the one extra petal and glue that inside the two-petal piece, too. Continue to stack the layers inside one another, from the smallest to the largest, and glue them together.





#### PAPER FLOWERS (CONTINUED)



step 7. Cut out some leaves, if desired, and glue them underneath the flower.



You now have a beautiful three-dimensional flower!
